BOY MEETS DOG ... AND THINGS GET COMPLICATED!

One of our youth has a real gift with animals of all kinds. Joshua is wonderful at caring for them, and pets respond in kind. So when Joshua spotted a dog in need of a home, he was on the case in a flash. No ordinary puppy, this was a full grown Rottweiler! And as responsible as we knew Joshua was, we had some real concerns. Large, strong, and with an unknown history, the dog's safety around kids was not clear. There was another concern as well: Joshua had recently experienced a major emotional trauma, and was in a fragile state. If ever a kid needed stability and support in his life, this was it.

So our team went to work on finding a solution in the emotionally supportive and trauma-informed way that is our model. For us, no 'extra miles' were involved. This is who we are, at home and at the Village. As a team with Joshua, we worked through researching the dog's history, ensuring child safety, and supporting Joshua in managing his emotions while creating a solution that involved and honoured everyone. Our staff treated this unexpected 4 footed member of our community with the same respect, caring, and advocacy as any child or youth. Joshua saw and experienced that what is important to him is also important to SOS: he matters.

As we progressed through hours of counselling, research, and calls, it became apparent that as much

as we all loved him, this sweet Rottweiler needed a different home than our Village. With Joshua's help, we found RainCoast Dog Rescue Society, who specialize in finding foster and forever homes for difficult-to-place dogs. RainCoast found a great foster home for the dog, and he has been adopted by the same family. They really helped Joshua negotiate this emotional situation, with enormous kindness and understanding.

Meanwhile, Joshua discovered more about the people who had been advertising the dog. We helped him to notify the BC SPCA, who are now investigating the case as animal cruelty. Joshua advocated for having a therapy dog at the Village, because he saw that — like himself — kids need somebody to love, be responsible for, help them heal. Again, everyone put their heads together and located a therapy dog who will make regular visits to the Village.

This story demonstrates some of the things that set SOS Children's Village BC apart from other foster care situations. Sadly, agency social workers are not given the support, time, resources, or training to deal creatively with these situations. Because children move frequently, there is no structure or protocol to respond to such needs.

At the SOS BC Village, our environment offered Joshua continuing support for learning, negotiating, and creating solutions that will benefit his whole community. Of course Joshua is grieving. He sure did love that dog. However, he has the whole Village to help him through. Between the therapy dog initiative and his new pet ferret, he has a new purpose for his love of animals. In addition, Joshua is a hero: BC SPCA, RainCoast Rescue, the dog's new family, our Village, and most importantly ... one happy Rottweiler! Through this process, Joshua has grown his capacity for research, social justice and animal welfare advocacy, emotional maturity, and collaborating with others to achieve a greater good.

Sometimes losing is winning.

Every child saved is hundreds of other lives helped as well. Every one of us feels blessed by your incredible dedication and commitment.




IT'S A BEAUTIFUL THING

ANNOUNCING OUR ACCREDITATION

SOS Children's Village BC is thrilled to announce that we have been awarded national accreditation through the New York-based Council on Accreditation (COA).

This achievement provides you with the confidence that our services are among the best in the nation. We provide the following services to children in foster care, youth aging out of care, and at-risk youth:

- The SOS Village in Surrey
- Transition to Adulthood Program
- Youth Housing Year Intensive Program
- Counselling, Expressive Art/Play Therapy
- Neurofeedback Training
- Learning Club Program
- Camp, Recreation, Cultural Exploration Program
- Sounds of Learning Music Program
- Caregiver Support Program

We also have a fee-for-service program called Parent Driven Autism Services, available to anyone.

Entire Organizational Effort: It took us 9 months of hard work to achieve accreditation. Organizations pursue accreditation to demonstrate the implementation of best practice standards in the field of human services. COA evaluated all aspects of our programs, services, management, and administration.

COA accreditation is an objective, independent, and reliable validation of an agency's performance. The COA accreditation process involves a detailed review and analysis of an organization's administration, management, and service delivery functions against international standards of best practice. The standards driving accreditation ensure that services are well-coordinated, culturally competent, evidence-based, outcomes-oriented, and provided by a skilled and supported workforce.

"We are so proud to have join the ranks of COA accredited agencies and look forward to embracing an organizational culture of continuing quality improvement in all aspects of our operations," said

Douglas Dunn, executive director of SOS BC.

Nerve-Wracking On Site Visit: To achieve COA accreditation, SOS BC first provided written evidence of compliance with the COA standards. Thereafter, a group of specially trained Peer Reviewers confirmed adherence to these standards during a series of on site interviews with board members, staff, volunteers, and clients over two days. Our staff were understandably on edge. Everything had led to this two day on site evaluation.

Shortly after the visit, and based on their findings, COA's volunteer-based Accreditation Commission voted that SOS Children's Village BC had successfully met the criteria for accreditation. Our staff (pictured below) were very relieved that everything went smoothly and their extra work for accreditation - on top of their normal work - paid off.

The biggest achievement was that SOS BC had no out-of-compliance ratings and was expedited through the final process, meaning there was no precommission review report required. Less than 10% of organizations going through the process achieve this feat. The reviewers told us afterwards our rankings were one of the best they had ever seen.

An endorsement of COA is reflected in it being named by the U.S. State Department as the sole national independent accrediting body under the Hague Convention on Intercountry Adoption to accredit intercountry adoption service providers.
